Ken Woodhouse—KCDC

- On-site Staff and Office (1 Program Manager, 3 CMs, 1 Business Engagement Coordinator, 1 Education Specialist, 1 VISTA, 1 CSW Intern)
- 123 households currently enrolled
- Assess vulnerability and work with them through goal-oriented plans
- Program goes through 2028
- Geography & Access
  - o Census tract 14 and part of tract 70
  - o Baptist Center (food pantry), Dollar General, Food City, Kroger
- Characteristics of Community Profile
  - 94% of residents report limited access to healthy food; 10 year less life expectancy than those in city; 84% of children experience poverty;
     Median income=\$14k HWC and \$10k HWA; 63% access SNAP; 43% report high blood pressure; 56% experience diabetes; 44% experience obesity; 68% have not seen a dentist within last 12 months

- Engagement Activities
  - 2 times per week Baptist Center Pantry (Tues/Thurs), Holiday Partner Food Boxes, Quarterly CAC Commodities, Free Store Pop Up Pantry, Resident Pot Luck, Community Cook Out, Cooking Classes, Nutrition Workshops, Budget/Meal Planning Sessions
- Qualitative Feedback from residents/case managers:
  - Lack of nutritious options from food options; need increased education and access to preventative care; transportation is a barrier; food delivery is popular but not economical
- Needs/Opportunities:
  - Volunteers and/or stations for walking school bus; healthier food options—considering diabetes and heart disease; shop with dignity pantry and/or pop ups; meals prepared for engagement events; kitchenware cooking supplies; nutrition and cooking classes; on-site gardening; increased SNAP enrollment and education on renewals; Real Good Kitchen partnership
- Housing, Neighborhood, and People (notes above) are the 3 goals of the grant
  - Housing
    - New Head Start building; renovate 1930s buildings; develop vacant areas; redevelop 1950s buildings
  - Neighborhood
    - Destination park; community-focused entrepreneurship and restaurant building; arts creation space; primary care medical office; Boys & Girls Club expansion; commercial façade enhancement program

### B. Reconnecting Communities: Marisa Moazen

- Redevelopment side of KCDC through grant from DOT
- Civic infrastructure plan to restore connections to emerging economic growth centers among formerly displaced populations
  - East Knoxville Gateway; First Creek at Austin Bridge and Connector; Stadium/Old City Connector; Cultural Corridor & Connectors; South Knoxville Bridge Connector; Cottrell Connector
- Partners & Community Advisory Council involved in this project
